**NOTICE.**  
Notice is hereby given that a petition, of which the following is a copy, has been filed in the office of the county auditor of Anoka County, State of Minnesota, and that a hearing will be had upon said petition before the board of county commissioners at the office of the county auditor of said county, on the 1st day of March A. D. 1909, at 10:30 o'clock a. m.

**PETITION FOR PUBLIC DITCH.**

To the board of county commissioners of the County of Anoka, State of Minnesota:  
The undersigned land owners, whose lands will be liable to be affected by, or assessed for, the expense of the construction of the public ditch hereinafter described, would respectfully represent that the public health, convenience and welfare and the reclamation of wet and overflowed lands require the establishment and construction of a public ditch along the following described route in the town of Ramsey, (T 32, R 25) in the said county of Anoka and that the construction of the same would be of public benefit and utility, and is necessary for the following reasons, to-wit: First—A ditch has been constructed westerly of the starting point of this proposed ditch which empties a large volume of water over several acres of meadow land near the proposed starting point, and this ditch is necessary to care for the flood waters.  
Second—There is a large number of acres of meadow lands lying in the valley of Trott Brook (so-called) which are kept wet by reason of the sluggish flow in the said brook, which can be made dry and become of greater value by cleaning, deepening and straightening the said brook.  
Third—The water standing on the afore mentioned marshes are a menace to the public health and will be removed by the proposed ditch.

A general description of the proposed starting point, route and terminus of the said proposed ditch is as follows:—  
Commencing at a point on the west line of section 7 of the town of Ramsey, T 32, R 25, where the said west line crosses Trott Brook (so-called) and thence following said brook and running easterly through the said section 7; into the north part of section 18 of the said township and through sections eight (8) and nine (9) of the said town of Ramsey, T 32, R 25, and terminating at a point in the said Trott Brook on the east line of section nine (9) of the township of Ramsey, T 32, R 25, where the said east line of section nine (9) crosses said Trott Brook, using the said Trott Brook as its outlet.  
And your petitioners pray that you will proceed to establish such proposed ditch and the necessary branches, and especially a branch commencing at 1/4 Sec. Cor. S. side Sec. 5, T 32, R 25, and running thence to Trott Brook, and cause the same to be constructed as provided by Chapter Two Hundred and Thirty (239) of the General Laws of 1905 and Laws amendatory thereof.
